Suggested Initial Steps

Transitioning to In-Person or Hybrid Learning Models

Considerations:

Where are our students in foster care living?

- Many students in foster care moved placements during the Pandemic.
- Is address and caregiver information up to date?
- Is Educational Rights Holder information up to date?
- Have all students in foster care been "attending" virtual learning?

Transitioning to In-Person or Hybrid Learning Models, cont'd

How do we start?

- Use the CAL Pads reports (5.7) to identify all enrolled students in foster care.
- Reach out to the social worker/probation officer listed to verify current placement.
- Who should do this outreach?

Transitioning to In-Person or Hybrid Learning Models, cont'd

Use this opportunity to check in on how the student is doing, and if the ERH has changed.

- Gather info and determine what supports might be needed.
- Has the student changed placements:
- Is there updated information for the SIS and Emergency Card.
- Will there be a Best interest Determination?
 - Ask to be notified immediately of the outcome.
- If the BID indicates a school change is best, assist with the transfer of all records.
- If the BID indicates school stability is best, check in about transportation needs.

School of Origin Rights


Youth in foster care have the right to remain in their school of origin, as a default, following a home placement change.

Youth in foster care should only be transferred to a new school if their ERH, with the consultation of foster youth liaison and youth agrees that it is in the youth's best interest.

School of Origin includes: The school the youth attended at the time they entered foster care; the school most recently attended; or any school the youth attended within the last 15 months to which the youth feels a connection.

Right to transportation according to a plan between child welfare and local education agency.
